- OFSC delivers wildfire preparedness workshops and public education



# This Firewise Recognized Site is located where everything had burned to the ground in the 1991 Oakland Firestorm!

As all homes on Grand View Drive were rebuilt after the fire, most (if not all) of them meet some of the Firewise home hardening standards. Therefore, the organizers' pitch to neighbors was to ensure safe evacuation routes. Part of the work includes clearing encroaching vegetation from roadways and keeping flammable debris to a minimum in two bordering eucalyptus groves.





Admittedly getting newer residents involved has been a harder sell for the group. However, they continue to reach out to their neighbors and, with the January wildfires in Los Angeles and the continuing insurance crisis, there is more and more interest in being involved. **SEE THE WHOLE STORY**

## Sacramento's Zone 0 Hearing: Why the First Five Feet Sparked the Biggest Fire Debate Yet

On August 18th, the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection convened a hearing in Sacramento to receive public comment on the proposed Zone 0 regulations.

Representatives from the Oakland Firesafe Council were in attendance, monitoring the hearing to keep

our community informed about emerging wildfire policy. Read our report

CAL FIRE Zone 0 deliberations: The next session of the Zone 0 Regulatory Advisory Committee will take place in Altadena on September 18, followed by another hearing in Sacramento on September 24, 2025.



On August 11, the Oakland Firesafe Council participated in a fishbowl panel discussion on *Fire and Water Resilience* hosted by the East Bay Permaculture Guild at the PLACE for Sustainable Living. The topic of discussion was "what does fire resilience look like in our communities"? Key points raised were that Fire has been part of our ecosystem for centuries and that indigenous & cultural burning are essential for healthy ecosystems, cultural health, and climate adaptation. Prescribed burning, water restoration, healthy soils and the creation of natural fire buffers are important elements in building resilience.

However, with the advent of densely populated urban environments that border

wildland areas, it is now more than ever important for communities to also get involved in neighborhood preparedness activities (for example Firewise), home hardening and vegetation management to create fire resilience and resistance in our communities. We must work together as a community to build resilience.


