






* However, most of us are **not** First Responder professionals!

We need to be able to care for ourselves, our families and our neighbors for several days, as first responders will likely be engaged elsewhere.

To do this requires being prepared!

BEFORE AN EMERGENCY

- ✓ 5 Most Important Steps
- ✓ Be Ready!

1) Receive Alerts and Notifications



Don't delay, register today!

Watches, Warnings and Orders

Fire Weather Watch: Prepare for Wildfire



- Red Flag Warning: Exercise Caution Be Ready!
- Evacuation Warning: Prepare to Evacuate
- Evacuation Order: Take Action Leave!
- Shelter-in-Place: Go Indoors, Stay Put
- Oakland Emergency Siren System: Monitor



2) Make a Family Emergency Plan

✓ Study a map to identify potential evacuation routes in <u>every</u> <u>direction</u>, plus local potential refuge areas



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- ✓ Study a map to identify potential evacuation routes in <u>every</u> <u>direction</u>, plus local potential refuge areas
- ✓ Designate meeting locations to reunite with family members, and an out-of-area contact to update
- ✓ Have a checklist of items to quickly grab (5/30/60 mins notice)
- ✓ Know which neighbors may need help (AFN), plan to assist
- ✓ Review and practice!






3) Be Ready for an Evacuation


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- Be able to monitor AC Alert, AM/FM radio, etc, for an evacuation notice, practice "situational awareness"
- Plan to assist neighbors that need help, and when leaving try to take <u>one vehicle</u> or carpool
- Practice all possible ways out (without GPS)
- Know that schools will protect children
- Have animal harnesses/carriers/leashes ready
- Keep > ½ tank gas/charge in your vehicle, park facing out
- > Remember to remain as calm as possible

4) Build Your Go-Bag to Survive 1 - 2 Days



Build Go-Bags for your home, vehicles and workplace

Build Your Stay-Box to Survive a Week+

And a Stay-Box with extra food and water, fire extinguishers, sanitary supplies, camping supplies, etc.



5) Help Family, Friends and Neighbors

- Build a connected community/organized neighborhood to better know and help each other
- ✓ Know who may need assistance and have a plan
- ✓ Trusted support network
- ✓ Alert each other to an emergency (phone tree/OCN*, d-2-d, TM, radios) *OneCallNow.com
- Encourage everyone to prepare

Harden Your Home Against Fire

Create 5' of no combustibles around your home – "Zone 0"



Work from the house out

Create 5' of no combustibles around your home – "Zone 0"



Regularly clean roofs and gutters!

- Create 5' of no combustibles around your home "Zone 0"
- Remove flammables on or under porches/decks and next to fences
- Install vent screens (≤ 1/8" mesh) or commercial vents to keep embers from entering



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- Check/replace outside and garage door weatherstripping
- Check/replace chimney spark arrestor, assess structure, keep clean
- > Have functioning smoke/CO detectors and working fire extinguishers

> Roof: UL Class A rated, metal gutters, tempered-glass skylights ideal



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- Box in open framed eaves
- Fences should have non-combustible sections next to structures



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- > Fences should have non-combustible sections next to structures
- Create hardscaped fire breaks, walkways, etc.
- > Tempered double-pane windows ideal, fire resistant shutters
- Roof/siding sprinkler or foam systems—pros and cons, separate water source advisable



Firescaping – Fire Smart Landscaping

- > Proper plant selection, placement and maintenance
- Start with whatever is in place
- A carefully Firescaped design will:
 - ✓ reduce the chance of ignition



- ✓ slow the spread of fire and give you more time to escape
- Leverage "fire-resistant" plants and trees plus hardscaping

Become Firewise USA® Recognized

- National Fire Protection Association program
- Encourages neighbors to work together on wildfire safety
- May help retain insurance, some companies give a discount
- Becoming a Firewise USA® site is a straight-forward process:
 - 1. Form small committee, create neighborhood assessment and action plan
 - 2. Neighbors invest one volunteer hour per home per year on average
 - 3. Report efforts back to the Firewise USA® program

Red Flag Watches and Warnings

Be extremely cautious and alert during Red Flag Warnings!

- National Weather Service issues RFWs when predicted weather conditions may result in extreme wildfire danger in 24/72 hours
- > Strong winds, low humidity, dry vegetation, potential lightning
- AC Alert, radio/TV, @NWSBayArea, Nextdoor, GENOAK, red flag
- Review family plan and evacuation checklist, have items ready
- > Be prepared to evacuate, consider temporarily relocating
- Don't smoke or use power tools, grills or any potential source of heat or spark outside

Harden Your Home Against Earthquake

Minimize structural and non-structural hazards inside and outside your home!

- > Secure appliances, bookshelves, water heater, etc.
- Install safety latches on cabinets
- Ensure porches/decks are secured to the house
- Have chimneys inspected/reinforced
- Know how to shut off utilities, consider an Auto (Seismic) Gas Valve
- Have your home inspected by a contractor or engineer certified in seismic work and consider recommended seismic upgrades



Prepare for Power Outages/PSPS/EPSS

Be Ready (note: PSPS typically on RFW days)

- > Sign-up at PG&E's Website for notices and info
- Prepare for your own medical needs
- Charge your devices and backup batteries
- Know how to open your garage door manually, consider a garage door opener battery back-up
- Check out backup power sources (PG&E rebate)
- Know that cell phone service isn't guaranteed!

Insurance

- ✓ Prepare by conducting a home inventory
 - ✓ List all contents in home, garage, etc.
 - ✓ Take videos or photographs

- ✓ Store online, give storage drive to trusted contact
- ✓ Ensure you have the right amount and type of insurance
- ✓ NFPA Firewise USA® program may help retain insurance

- ✓ Be Safe don't become part of the disaster!
- ✓ Take Action

What Should I Do?!



If a wildfire approaches

- Monitor AC Alert, AM/FM radio, Genasys, 2-way radio, surroundings, etc.
- Evacuate if ordered, or if you feel unsafe at any time—LEAVE!
- Follow your plan and help others in your neighborhood if possible
- When evacuating, a vehicle will provide some protection, but may have to proceed on foot

What Should I Do?!



What 3 steps should you take when a major earthquake occurs and the ground is shaking?

What Should I Do?!



After the shaking is over

- Check yourself, family and home, go outside if home is damaged
- Monitor surroundings, watch for fires, expect aftershocks
- Help others in your neighborhood
- You may not need to evacuate (unless ordered or if you feel unsafe)

RECOVER

AFTER AN EMERGENCY

- ✓ Be Aware
- ✓ Be Helpful!

Evaluate and Be Safe

- Breathe, recompose and check yourself
- Evaluate your family's health
- Wear a mask, gloves, eye protection, sturdy shoes, long sleeves and pants
- Only return home when authorized
- Check your home for unsafe conditions



Help Others and Check In

- ✓ Provide caring support to others, "See the Need, Say the Need"
- ✓ Check in with your contacts
 - ✓ Get in touch with your out-of-area contact
 - ✓ Send text messages during limited cell service
 - ✓ Post your status on social media
- ✓ City and American Red Cross may open shelters
